





Be brave and be open to feedback



Brief Description. 'Saga ni wai Double 'twin' container water vessel Made from gele (clay). Wa ni tabua (crossover handle) with hole out out at the centre top. There is a hole on the centre-top of container. I gaga (pouring spout) on the end of a container Somuna (raised applique spots) decorate the waist of the spherical containers, with two rows extending across the centre-top of the handle Incisions decorate the handle and tops of the spherical containers. Outer surface coated with makadre (resin from the Dakua tree).
